When I was young, my father suggested me to take Kendo Dan promotion examination. I declined by saying that I had already obtained the next rank caliber and no need to have the certificate for it.

My father told me when parents want their children start kendo practice and how they search the right dojo for their children to join because they do not have much knowledge of kendo. They will look at instructors' ranks. They normally select the dojo with higher rank instructors because they know instructors may be good and have practiced hard enough to achieve higher ranks. They must have better experience how to teach students than lower rank senseis.

Try to get Dan promotion as quick as possible. As you try for higher ranks, it gets the harder. The higher ranks go, the harder to pass examinations. As you grow older, you may develop physical limitations. In my father's case, worsening knee problems prevented him to continue to seek higher rank.
