Wahiawa Hongwanji Mission Annual Eitaikyo Service Sunday, November 2nd


The Wahiawa Hongwanji Mission will hold its annual Eitaikyo Service on Sunday, November 2nd at 9:00 a.m. Our guest speaker will be Rev. David Nakamoto.

Eitaikyo is a Japanese Buddhist tradition that honors the continuous chanting of sutras, Buddha's teachings, ensuring they are passed down through generations. A dedicated fund helps sustain this practice and supports the long-term future of the temple.

Families may make special donations to the Eitaikyo Fund in memory of loved ones. While donations are accepted year-round, many choose to contribute during the annual service. Donors who give \$300 or more by one week before the service will have their loved one's name called during the ceremony, and family members will be invited to offer incense

Minister's Message - Right Livelihood

I would like to share my thoughts about Right Livelihood, which is the fifth step of the Eightfold Path. Right Livelihood means avoiding any way of life that brings shame.



What are shameful things in life?

First, avoid doing things that could get you arrested by the police.

Second, do not complain or use abusive words.

Third, do not let anger control you.

Right Livelihood is like the other steps on the path that I mentioned before. As Buddhists, we reflect on what is considered shameful in life, not just from our own perspective, but through mindfulness and awareness in the present moment.

Shakyamuni Buddha said:

"Do not follow the past. Do not seek the future. The past is already gone. The future has not yet come." These words remind us to live in the present moment.

Let me share a story.

There is a writer named Hiroshi Abe. He was once a member of the Yakuza. When he was in jail, his mother came to visit him. He expected her to scold him or express disappointment. He felt ashamed and prepared himself for her anger.

But when she saw him, she simply said,

"Because you are here, I was able to see the inside of a jail. Thank you."

He was shocked by her words. If she had criticized or complained, he might never have changed his life. But she didn't. Instead, she said "thank you."

She accepted the present moment and didn't dwell on the past. She knew that reminding him of his past mistakes would not help. Her words gave him the strength to reclaim his life.

We often regret things: "I should have done that," or "I shouldn't have done this." These thoughts are natural, but before regret, we should accept our experiences.

As Buddhists, we turn to Amida Buddha's words, no matter what happens. Amida Buddha said: "You are as you are."

Not forgetting these words, and putting our hands together in gassho (a gesture of respect and gratitude), is how we live with Right Livelihood as Buddhists.

Presidents' Corner

We have a very important event occurring in November. Wahiawa Hongwanji and Hoala School will be sponsoring a blood drive for the Blood Bank of Hawaii on November 16, 2025, from 10:00 am – 3:00 pm in the Wahiawa Hongwanji parking lot. The Blood Bank of Hawaii explained why blood donations are critical for everyone in Hawaii. Every two seconds someone is in need of blood. A friend, a son, a daughter,



a mother of a newborn, and a cancer patient. . . the list goes on and on. General medical patients comprise 36% of the blood, followed by cancer patients at 20%, then general surgery patients at 16%, next heart patients at 15%, and finally, emergency & trauma patients at 11%.

It's important that the quota is met daily to ensure an ample supply of blood. Blood cannot be bought or manufactured. The only way it is obtained is through donation.

You can save a life by signing up. Please look at the flyer on the last page and scan the QR code to select an appointment time. Our goal is to fill all 40 slots.

Thank you very much for your support in this campaign. Even if you are unable to donate, please help us spread the word about the blood drive by sharing the enclosed with your family and friends. We can all be a part of making a valuable contribution to our community and state. Together we can save lives!

Farewell to Manzanar is a 1976 made-for-television film based on the book by Jeanne Wakatsuki Houston and James D. Houston. The movie tells the story of Jeanne Wakatsuki's experiences as a Japanese American child imprisoned with her family at Manzanar during World War II, exploring themes of resilience, identity, and family.

In today's context, it is essential for those in our community to remember and understand what occurred in the U.S, including Hawai'i, at another time in history: the forced removal and incarceration of Japanese Americans by federal agents.
