Minister's Message - The Spirit of "Jiri-Rita": Finding Joy in My Daughter's Journey.

In Buddhism, there is a beautiful teaching called Jiri-Rita (自利利他), which means "to benefit oneself and others at the same time." It reminds us that true happiness does not come from thinking only of ourselves, but from realizing that when we act with kindness and sincerity, our actions naturally bring joy and comfort to others as well.

Recently, I had the honor of attending the graduation ceremony of my daughter, Kano, who completed her flight attendant training. It was a deeply moving experience. She not only achieved her lifelong dream of becoming a flight attendant, but she also endured a long process of interviews, followed by eight intense weeks of training and examinations. I learned that some trainees, unfortunately, could not complete the course, so I felt both proud and relieved that she was able to finish successfully.

When we board an airplane, we are literally not standing on solid ground. There can be moments of turbulence and unease. Yet, the calm and gentle smiles of the flight attendants have the power to ease passengers' anxiety. Their presence brings peace during uncertainty — just like the compassion (jihi, 慈悲) of the Buddha, who embraces all beings without judgment.

After the ceremony, a few of her classmates came to me and said, "Thanks to Kano, I was able to get through the training." Hearing that filled my heart with joy. I realized that, from her childhood, she has listened to Buddhist values, she had naturally learned the spirit of Jiri-Rita — caring for others while also growing herself.

This reminds me of a story from the Buddhist sutras. Once, a bodhisattva saw a bird struggling in a storm. He sheltered it with his robe, though he became drenched and cold. When the storm passed, the bird flew away singing — and the bodhisattva felt a deep warmth in his heart. In that simple act of compassion, he discovered that helping others is never a loss; it is the true path to one's own peace. (by Jātaka Tales)

In the same way, when we support others — whether as a parent, a friend, or a fellow traveler in life — our hearts are also nurtured. This is the living practice of Jiri-Rita.

Let us all remember to live with gratitude and a sense of "Okagesama" — the awareness that we are supported by countless unseen causes and conditions. Each day, may we act with appreciation and kindness toward others, knowing that such actions enrich our own lives as well.

Presidents' Corner

At the last Wahiawa Hongwanji Board of Trustees meeting on September 21st, there was a discussion about the Bylaws, especially about the officers of Wahiawa Hongwanji. Currently, we are not in compliance with the Bylaws because we have two presidents, instead of one. The Board sought to remedy the situation by amending with the insertion of [President or Presidents] in Articles VII, VIII, XI. The following changes will be in red to signify the changes requested by the amendment.



ARTICLE VII – OFFICERS AND TRUSTEES

Section 1. The elected officers of WAHIAWA HONGWANJI MISSION shall be a President [President or Presidents], three Vice Presidents, one Secretary, one Assistant Secretary, one Treasurer, one or more Assistant Treasurers.

Section 4. Any vacancy occurring in any of the aforesaid offices shall be filled by the President [President or Presidents] subject to approval by the Board of Trustees. The person so chosen shall serve the unexpired term.

ARTICLE VIII – Duties

Section 3. The President [President or Presidents] shall preside at all meetings of the WAHIAWA HONGWANJI MISSION Board of Trustees. The President [President or Presidents] shall appoint chairmen for all standing and special committees. The President [President or Presidents] shall have general charge of all business and affairs of the WAHIAWA HONGWANJI MISSION, subject to the direction of the Executive Board of Trustees.

Section 4. One or up to 3 Vice Presidents shall be designated with duties as follows:

The Vice Presidents shall assist the President [President or Presidents] and act in his/her [their] place in the event of his/her [their] absence. He/She shall also be assigned other duties by the President [President or Presidents], subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees. Duties to be assigned shall include advisory and ex-officio positions in any of the Standing, Finance, Administration, Fundraising, Publication and Property Management (including Maintenance) Committees. Chairpersons for each of the above committees shall be appointed by the President [President or Presidents] subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees.

The Vice President appointed by the President [Presidents or Presidents] will chair the nominating committee.

Section 7. All contracts, deeds, bills of sale, mortgages, promissory notes, and other important instruments of WAHIAWA HONGWANJI MISSION shall be signed by any two of the following: President [President or Presidents], any Vice President, the Treasurer, any Assistant Treasurer. The Board of Trustees shall establish all special committees.

ARTICLE XI – Meeting

Section 5. Regular meeting of the Board of Trustees will be held at least 6 times a year. Executive Board meetings shall be held upon the call of the President [President or Presidents].

The approval of the amendments to the Bylaws will be on December 14 at the General Membership meeting after the temple cleanup. We need a 2/3 vote to pass this amendment for our leadership to continue. We'll see you at the clean up and meeting beginning at 9am.

TOKUDO

The Tokudo Shurai (training) took place from September 30 to October 10, 2025, at the Tokudo Training Center next to the Nishiyama Betsuin in Kyoto, Japan. It is an intensive program covering Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha's doctrine, history, bylaws, and rituals, preparing participants to receive *Docho*, a certificate confirming their priesthood. Participants from overseas included Dexter Mar (Hawaii Betsuin), Raymond Takiue Jr. (Moiliili Hongwanji), and Rodney Moriyama (Wahiawa Hongwanji) from Hawaii, along with five members from the Buddhist Churches of America, one from the Jodo Shinshu Buddhist Temples of Canada, and four from Europe. They completed the rigorous training and participated in the solemn Tokudo Ordination Ceremony led by Monshu Kojun Ohtani at Hongwanji on October 9, 2025.


Come for the food, stay for the culture, and celebrate the heart of Wahiawā at this fun community event!

DOCOMOMO Hawaii

On October 11, 2025, a walking tour was conducted by the DOCOMOMO Hawaii organization. The acronym stands for Documentation and Conservation of the Modern Movement, a national nonprofit organization dedicated to the documentation and conservation of buildings, sites, and neighborhoods.

Tonia Moy, architect with FAI Architects, an award-winning design and preservation firm, was the docent for the group of about 25 people. The group was interested in the modern look of the temples and churches in Wahiawa. According to the brochure distributed, the design of the churches changed from the previous designs that always displayed a cross. In the newer designs, the roof design was the most significant design change. Glancing through their brochure, the churches in Wahiawa displayed similarities.

The group was invited into the temple and Rev. Hashimoto explained about the naijin and the significance of the items. Carolyn Uchiyama gave a short history of the temple's origins. After ringing the bonsho bell, the group continued their walk to the next church.
