Minister's Message - Hoshi



This month's theme is Ho-shi, which means "Service."

As Buddhists, we may ask ourselves: How can we offer service to others and to ourselves in our daily lives?

One of the fundamental Buddhist practices is Dana. Dana means the perfect practice of selfless giving — the act of offering that arises from a sincere and compassionate heart. If everyone in the world were to practice Dana, there would be no wars or conflicts. Peace would naturally flourish among all people. Therefore, it is important for us, as followers of the Buddha's teaching, to try to practice Dana in our daily lives.

Although the practice of Dana may seem difficult at first, it becomes easier when we approach it with the spirit of mindfulness and gratitude. The Buddha taught that Dana is not limited to material giving. In fact, there are seven kinds of Dana that anyone can practice without spending any money.

1眼施 (Gense) – Giving through the Eyes

This means looking at others with warmth and kindness. Avoid giving cold or harsh looks. A gentle and friendly gaze can bring comfort and peace to others.

2和顔悦色施 (Waganetsujise) – Giving through the Face

This means to share a pleasant and gentle smile. A smile is a universal expression of kindness that can bring joy to those around you.

3言辞施 (Gonjise) – Giving through Words

This means to speak kindly and gently. Avoid using harsh or hurtful language. Our words have great power—they can either harm or heal. Let us use them to encourage and uplift others.

4身施 (Shinse) – Giving through the Body

This means to offer your time, effort, and actions to help others. When someone asks for help, respond willingly and sincerely. Volunteering and helping those in need are beautiful expressions of Dana.

5心施 (Shinse) – Giving through the Heart

This means to act with a heart of compassion and sincerity. Without a kind heart, it is difficult to perform truly meaningful actions. When our hearts are filled with compassion, goodness naturally flows from us.

6床座施 (Shozase) – Giving through One's Seat

This means to give up your seat or place to others. It is a small but thoughtful gesture that shows humility and respect.

7房舍施 (Boshase) – Giving through Hospitality

This means to offer the best welcome to others. It is not only about receiving guests in your home, but also about being kind and considerate to everyone you meet.

Let us keep these seven forms of Dana in our hearts and do our best to practice them in our daily lives. Through these simple yet profound acts of giving, we can bring more kindness, understanding, and harmony to our families, our communities, and to the world.

President's Corner

The Honpa Hongwanji's theme for the next four years is "Nurturing Nembutsu," and the slogan changes every year. For 2026, the slogan is "Sharing Gratitude," and gratitude is the foundation of Jodo Shinshu.

Each temple member has received an envelope labeled "Social Concerns." You may have wondered what Social Concerns entails and how the contributions are utilized.

Honpa Hongwanji has a Social Concerns committee that is chaired by Rev. Blayne Higa of Kona Hongwanji. The committee is composed of members that represent each island from Kauai to the Big Island. In 2024-2025, the committee successfully collected \$32,955.00. The current fund drive will run from November 1, 2025 to August 31, 2026.

The committee convenes quarterly to identify non-profit organizations in need of financial assistance. Their requests are presented to the Honpa Hongwanji Board of Directors' meeting for approval. On December 13, 2025, the following was approved:

\$1,000 - Honokaa Hongwanji Feed the Keiki and Kupuna Program

\$1,000 - Family Promise of Hawaii

\$1,000 - Lanakila Pacific

\$1,000 - Ma'o Farms

\$1,000 - The Interfaith Alliance Hawaii

\$1,000 - Pacific Health Ministry

\$2,000 - Hawaii Red Cross

\$2,000 - A Cup of Cold Water

\$2,000 - Maui Farm

In addition to the above, with the recent federal government shutdown and the disruption of SNAP benefits, the committee made emergency donations of \$2,000 each to the following organizations to help address food insecurity in our communities:

- Hawaii Foodbank
- Maui Foodbank
- Hawaii Foodbank Kauai
- Kauai Independent Food Bank
- The Food Basket, Hawaii Island's Food Bank

Please consider your own contributions to these or other worthy organizations that are making a difference in our community. Non-profits play a crucial role in our social safety net, helping to keep our community strong during these challenging times.

You can bring or mail your Social Concerns envelope to Wahiawa Hongwanji, address checks to Wahiawa Hongwanji with "Social Concerns" on the memo line. To date, our temple has raised \$1,570. At the end of the campaign, Wahiawa Hongwanji will write one check to Honpa Hongwanji.

We want to express our deepest gratitude for all your generous donations; at temple services, special events such as bon dance and our various fundraisers. Your generosity will undoubtedly strengthen the Dharma in our community.

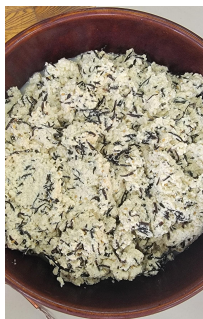
